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Coaching for business success: From homo economicus to home sapiens

Convincing corporate directors and financial leaders that they can increase shareholder value and overall performance by **investing** in human capital remains a crucial challenge for the future of business and leadership coaching.

In this contribution, we will discuss how behavioral economics and evidence-based management can provide arguments, models, and data that may appeal to skeptical or numbers-driven senior executives and allow them to appreciate the potential impact of professional coaching for business success. Using practical examples from banking and finance, information technology, and the life sciences, I will illustrate how insights from these two domains can provide leverage at different stages of organizational and leadership development. Finally, we will consider the importance of professional qualification, supervision, and training to establish and maintain a positive vision of coaching in organizations and thereby provide credibility in terms of financial risk and return on investment.
